"An Act Regarding Automotive Right to Repair"

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repair vehicles. In the absence of the Legislature taking action on the legislation, the initiative will be decided by voters in the Fall election.

The proponents, spearheaded by the Maine Right to Repair Coalition, argue that independent repair shops and consumers should have access to the same data that is transmitted to manufacturers and dealerships.

The opponents, largely represented by the trade group lobby Alliance for Automotive Innovation (AAI), claim that the data is already available to independent repair shops and consumers through a memorandum of understanding (MOU) that was drafted by manufacturers. A MOU conveys intent, although it is not legally binding.

"Right to Repair" initiatives or legislation have appeared in more than 40 states as of this year. Voters in Massachusetts approved a right to repair law in 2020, which was subsequently challenged in court by the AAI. The Massachusetts attorney general announced on March 8, 2023, that the law would go into effect June 1.

A DAY AT THE STATE CAPITAL, By Linda Souers, Friendship

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April 3, 2023 was the day for a public hearing on proposed legislation concerning firearms. All public hearings are available as live video at https://legislature.maine.gov/Calendar. However, I attended the hearing in person to support our local legislators and the organization "Mom's Demand Action for Gun Sense in America"

https://momsdemandaction.org/. As a relatively recent full time resident in Maine, it was my first visit to the Capitol in Augusta, and provided insight into an important slice of public participation during the legislative session.

The Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety is comprised of three Senators (2 Democrats & 1 Republican) and 10 House Representatives (6 Democrats & 4 Republicans), with our own Knox County Sen. Pinny Beebe-Center as Co-Chair. On this day, three bills were presented for public comment; LD 22 "An Act to Impede the Transfer of Firearms to Prohibited Persons", LD 60 "An Act to Require a 72-hour Waiting Period After the Sale of a Firearm", and LD 168 "An Act Regarding Criminal Background Checks for the Sale, Transfer or Exchange of Firearms". Sen. Beebe-Center of Knox Co. and Rep. Doudera of Camden are cosponsors of LD 22. All three bills are sponsored solely by Democrats.

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I was amazed to see that the public hearing, which drew a large crowd given the subject matter, was held in a room with seating for only about 30 members of the public, rm. 436 in the State House. Other visitors were invited to stay in the side rooms equipped with video links. Persons who had registered to speak on one or more of the bills were called in turn to the podium in front of the committee.

About 80 or more people provided testimonials, for or against passage of the bills. Committee members asked questions of each person if so desired. As you can imagine, the opinions on all sides of the issues were strongly expressed and impactful.

Visitors encouraging passage of bills to increase public health, welfare & safety were countered by those visitors opposing any new measures that may further restrict firearm use and ownership. These three bills have not received any further action or moved out of committee as of this writing.
